A Letter from the CEO

Spring is in the air in Central Virginia and we are looking forward to the many projects on the horizon for 2020 and the coming decade. This year, CVEC will continue to focus on meeting member needs by providing superior customer service, reliable and affordable electricity, and the opportunity to subscribe to rural broadband across our entire service territory.

Plans are currently in progress for a **new construction work plan**. The work plan evaluates our existing infrastructure and identifies areas for improvement that will result in upgrades and, ultimately, improved service reliability. The mild winter has positively impacted CVEC's reliability and we are well under our goals for the first two months of the year. However, the construction work plan and attention to our rights-of-way are critical to keeping your lights on, regardless of the weather conditions.

The fiber build across the service area will also help to increase reliability. Fiber makes it possible to communicate more quickly and efficiently from our dispatch center to the field, helping to find trouble spots and shorten outages. **While state regulations do not allow CVEC to sell internet services directly, we have established our wholly-owned subsidiary, Firefly Fiber BroadbandSM, to provide retail internet access through the fiber.** CVEC has applied for grants and incentive funds from the local, state and federal levels and has secured over \$50 million from all sources combined to use towards the \$120 million project. CVEC has the infrastructure on which to build the fiber and is pleased to be a part of the solution. The sunny weather brings increased energy production at solar sites across the country. CVEC members benefit from solar energy in their overall energy portfolio and can opt to subscribe to Solar Share, a community solar program that was launched in 2018. **Plans for two more solar arrays on our system are underway** and will be up and running in 2021. In addition, battery storage will capture energy and allow it to be deployed at other times during the day.

Looking out for CVEC members' best interest is our mission and we know that your time is valuable. Please be sure to subscribe to our text alerts and download the mobile app so we can keep you apprised of important account information, including usage and due dates, as well as outage and restoration details. Finally, CVEC strives to keep your bill as low as possible. **You should have noticed a decrease in your bill beginning January 2020.** Saving money and saving time are two of the ways CVEC is making sure we remain a good value and a good partner. Here's to the start of what looks to be a great decade!

CVEC Rural Broadband Update

CVEC and Firefly Fiber BroadbandSM receive \$28,000,000 in funds from the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) ReConnect Program.

The announcement was made last month at the Buckingham Agricultural Resource Network building by USDA Virginia State Director, Beth Green. Over 200 co-op leaders, elected officials, dignitaries, members, business partners, and employees gathered to celebrate the news.

CVEC and Firefly applied for the 50% grant/50% loan and will use the funds to help build fiber to 11 of its 30 substations. The Curdsville substation in Buckingham will be the first stop for building fiber using grants funds, followed by Cartersville in Cumberland and Goochland counties, Stonewall in Appomattox County, and Kidd's Store in Fluvanna County. CVEC has committed to a \$120 million plan to install over 3,600 miles of fiber-optic cable in the 14 counties it serves, providing broadband internet to all of its 37,000 members.

Updates on the CVEC fiber build can be found on our newly updated website and our Facebook page. Letters detailing construction and timelines will be sent to members as each build area is announced.

Democratic Member Control

CVEC is a member-owned electric cooperative. Each year, CVEC holds an election at the Annual Meeting to select members to serve as directors and represent the membership in setting policies and making decisions.

The next CVEC Annual Meeting will be June 10, 2020.

Members interested in running for a director position can make a "Member Petition Nomination," which must:

- List the name of the nominee;
- Indicate the director position for which the Member Petition Nominee will run;
- Contain the printed names, addresses, and original signatures of at least 100 CVEC Members;
- Use the Member Petition Nomination Form contained in the Director Candidate Packet, which is available from the Cooperative.

Member Petition Nominations must be delivered to the Cooperative at least 75 days prior to the Member Meeting.

CVEC Awarded Habitat Partners® Certificate

Central Virginia Electric Cooperative performs extensive work each year to cut and maintain rights-of-way for new and existing electric lines along its 4,500-mile system.

Well-maintained rights-of-way are essential to providing reliable and safe electric service, as well as ideal habitats for wildlife and low-growth vegetation.

Recently, CVEC was awarded a "Habitat Partners® Certificate" from the Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries (DGIF) for its large-scale habitat management efforts in its rights-of-way. Such work helps to control invasive exotic species, minimize mowing and herbicide applications, and promote the growth of native perennial flowers, which support a great diversity of wildlife species such as pollinators and quail.

CVEC's vegetation management efforts promise positive results for both the environment and CVEC's service reliability. CVEC invests \$2.5 million annually in its vegetation management program in order to increase reliability for its members and to remove danger trees from areas near the electric lines. Clearing the rights-of-way also allows safe access for CVEC linemen and trucks if the power needs to be restored or lines need to be repaired or upgraded.

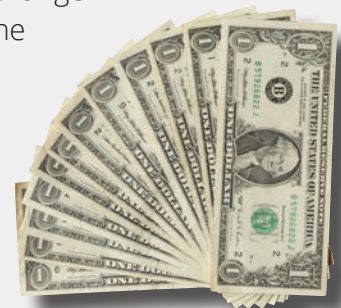

Look for extra savings on your energy bill!

CVEC members are benefiting from lower energy bills as of January 1, 2020! The combination of new, lower cost power contracts and a change in the method by which the cost of power that CVEC receives from Dominion has resulted in savings to members of \$6.5 million. Your savings are about one penny per kWh, which is a little over \$10 per month for the average household use of 1,200 kWh! You can find the change reflected in the PCA line on your bill.



CVEC Constructs New Substation

System improvements are underway at CVEC substations and the impact can be felt as far away as Richmond!

CVEC has been partnering with Henrico County on the construction of a new substation in Cumberland County that will provide more reliable electricity to members, as well as to the Cobb's Creek reservoir pump station. Since the new construction benefits both parties, CVEC and Henrico County are sharing the cost.

The construction of this substation will allow CVEC to eliminate the Columbia Metering Point that serves 475 members in Cumberland and Fluvanna counties and the newer substation will provide more reliable electricity service. In addition, the Cobb's Creek substation will help to get much-needed water from the James River into the reservoir for use by Richmond residents. As part of the work plan, CVEC will construct a link to the Columbia substation this year. The link will allow CVEC to switch between Columbia and Cobb's Creek to serve as a back-up in the event a power loss occurs. The new substation will come online this spring.

Existing substations are also undergoing system improvements to prepare for the fiber build and help assure the highest level of reliability. Members who are served by the following substations might notice work in their neighborhoods: Midway, Martin's Store, and Stonewall. As always, vehicles driven by CVEC employees and contractors will be labeled so you know who is on your property.

Never fly kites or drones near substations.

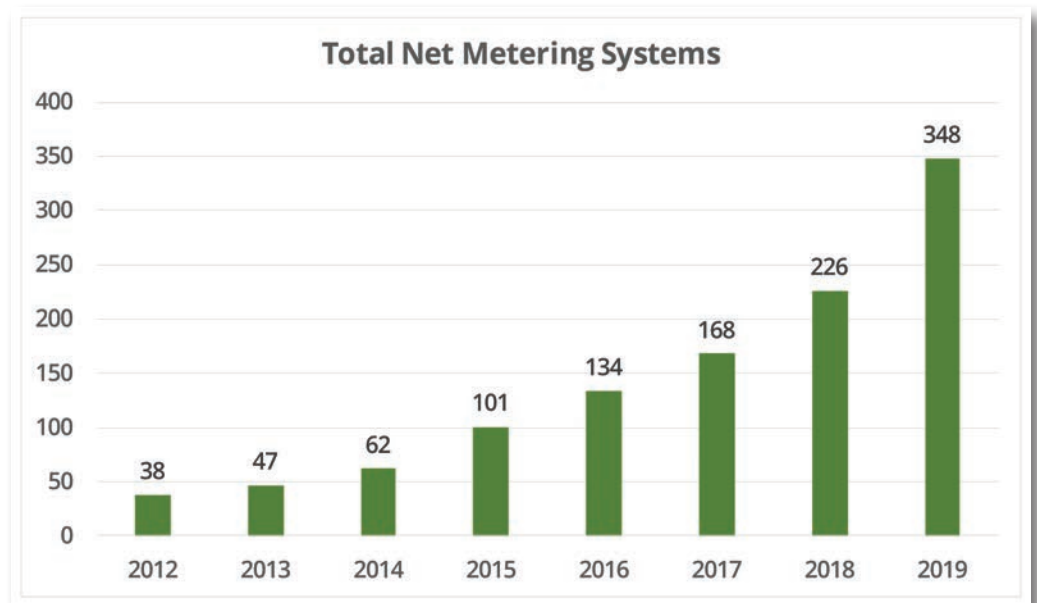


Never release metallic balloons near substations, which can cause outages when they contact power lines.

CVEC Members Embrace Green Energy

CVEC experienced an unprecedented increase in members installing solar panels on their homes in 2019.

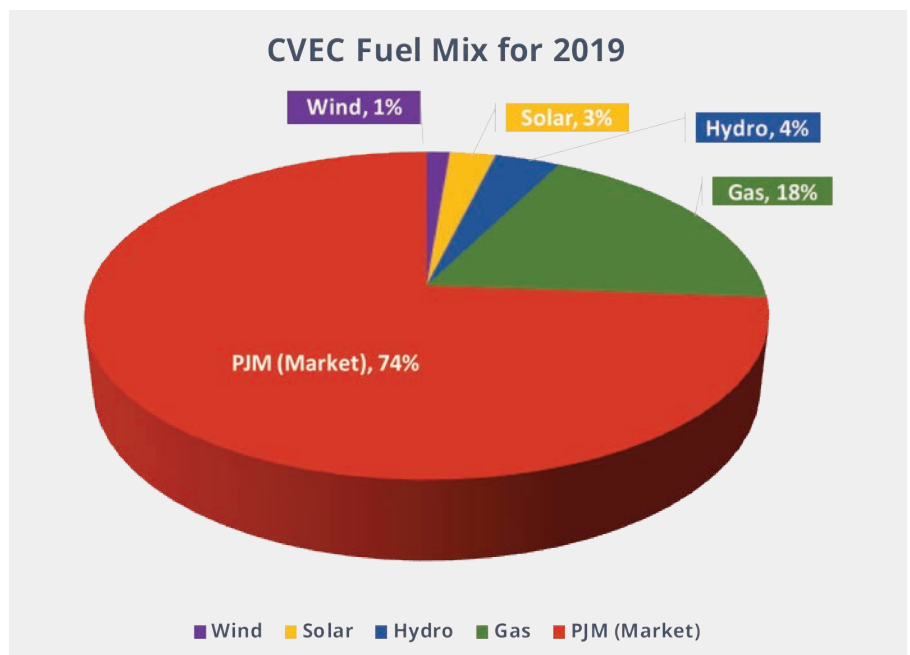
Since the inception of the program, CVEC has seen growth of about 30 homes per year. However, in 2019, the number increased by over 150% to 122. The boom in home installations was due to interest in green energy, as well as the generous 30% tax incentive offered by Uncle Sam. Almost 350 CVEC members have solar panels installed on their homes as of January 1, 2020.



Members who rely on the power from their own solar panels have a special metering and billing agreement with CVEC called net metering that allows the member to connect their solar panels to the power grid. If the solar panels generate more power than the member consumes, the electric meter runs backwards and generates a credit to the member. Similarly, the meter will run forward if the member uses more power than is generated by the solar panels. Ultimately, net metering members are only charged for the net power consumed from CVEC. The benefits of net metering systems include lessening our reliance on fossil fuels, increasing the range of our current energy sources, and minimizing the environmental impact of electricity generation and consumption.

In 2018, CVEC brought two 5 megawatt (MW) solar sites online and launched Solar Share, the community solar option for members who want more green energy in their power mix but are not able or do not wish to install solar panels on their homes. CVEC is working on adding an 8 MW and 5 MW solar site near our Midway and Cunningham substations in 2021. Battery storage will be used at one site to store energy produced during the day for use during non-generating or peak times.



Unclaimed Capital Credits

As a not-for-profit electric distribution cooperative, CVEC is owned by its members. The members contribute investment in the lines, poles and substations as part of the rates they pay for electric service. This money is then used for distribution line investment for a period and eventually returned to the members. Over the years, CVEC has returned almost \$19 million to members. This year's refund marks the tenth consecutive year for refunds.

Patronage Capital:

CVEC does not have "profits" that go into executive bonuses or shareholder dividends. Instead, all revenues we receive through our rates beyond our costs for providing electric service remain the property of our members.

How does that work? At the end of the year, the Cooperative allocates electric service margins to the members in the form of patronage capital. Patronage capital represents the members' ownership and investment in the Cooperative. Patronage capital is used to maintain and improve the distribution system and should be viewed as members' investment in the lines, poles and substations of the Cooperative.

Capital Credits:

Each year, the Board of Directors determines if the Cooperative will refund a portion of patronage capital to the members. This refund is issued in the form of capital credits. This refund of capital is one of the many benefits of being a cooperative member.

The Board of Directors of Central Virginia Electric Cooperative (CVEC) authorized \$1.2 million in capital credit refunds to Cooperative member-owners in December. This refund was used to retire the remaining 50% of the 1991 patronage capital allocations and 100% of the allocations from 1992, and 10% of the allocations from 2018. In December, members received a check if their refund exceeded \$100 or a bill credit for refunds less than \$100.

Unclaimed Capital Credits:

In 2018, CVEC issued a partial refund of capital credits allocated to those who were members in 1991 and 2017. Members due a refund greater than \$100 were mailed checks. A portion of the checks were not deposited or were returned as undeliverable. Following is a list of members who have not claimed their refund.

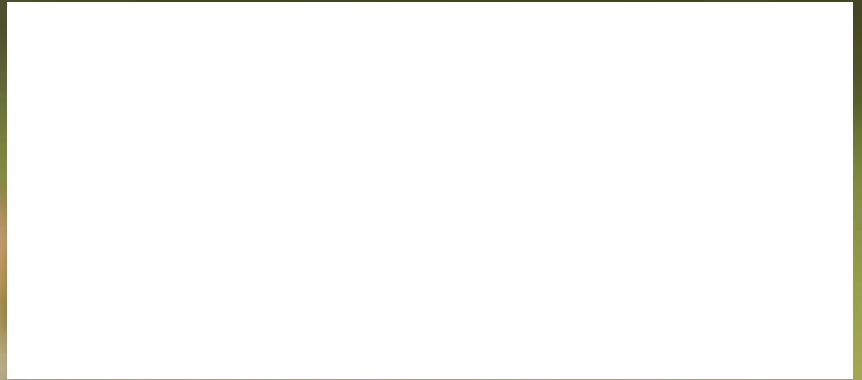
